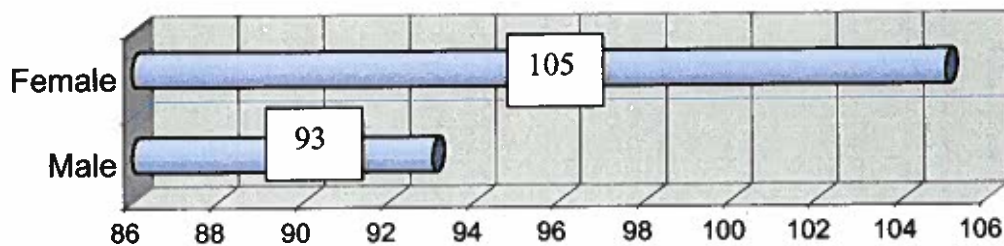

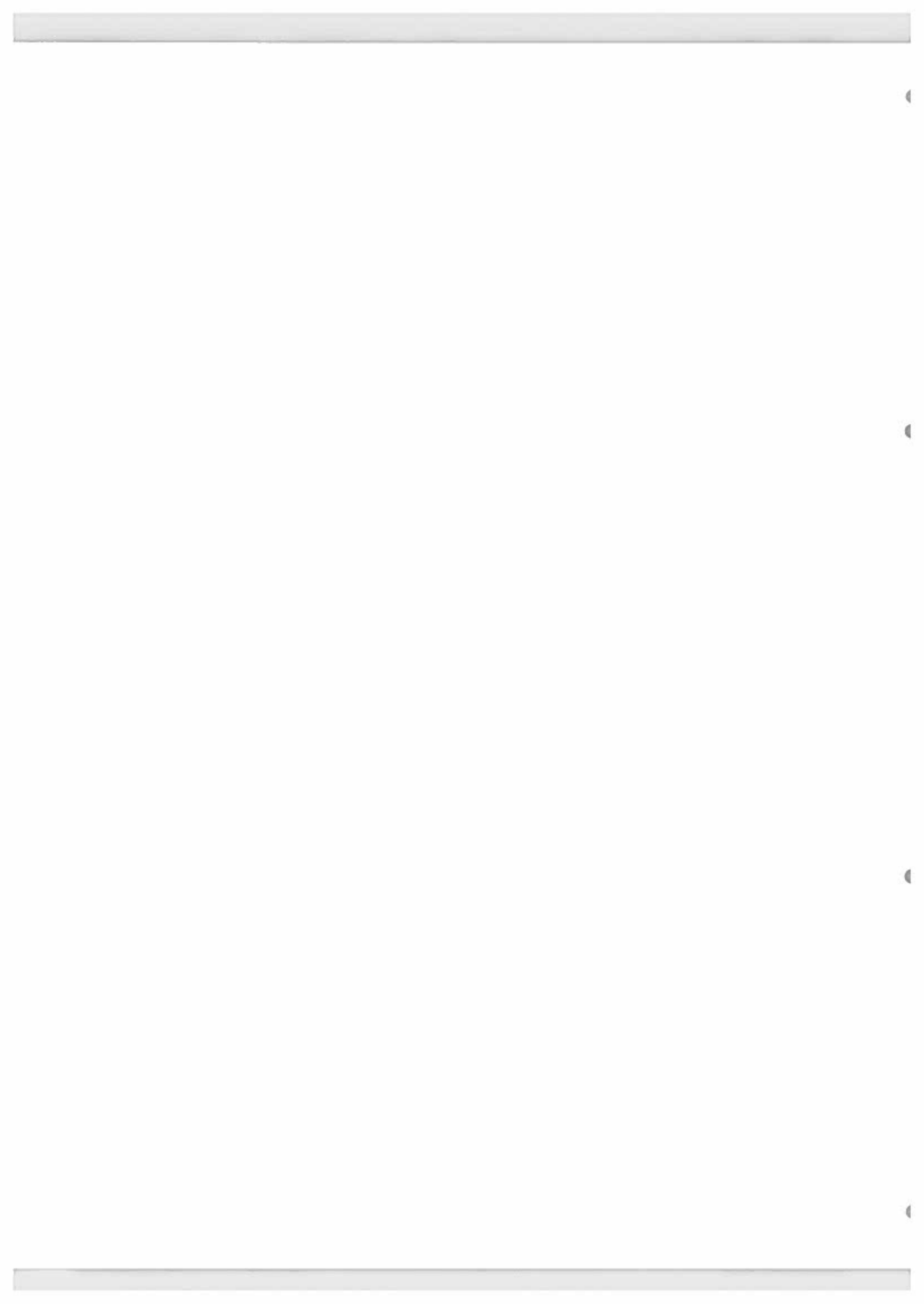
Fall 2002 Personnel by Gender



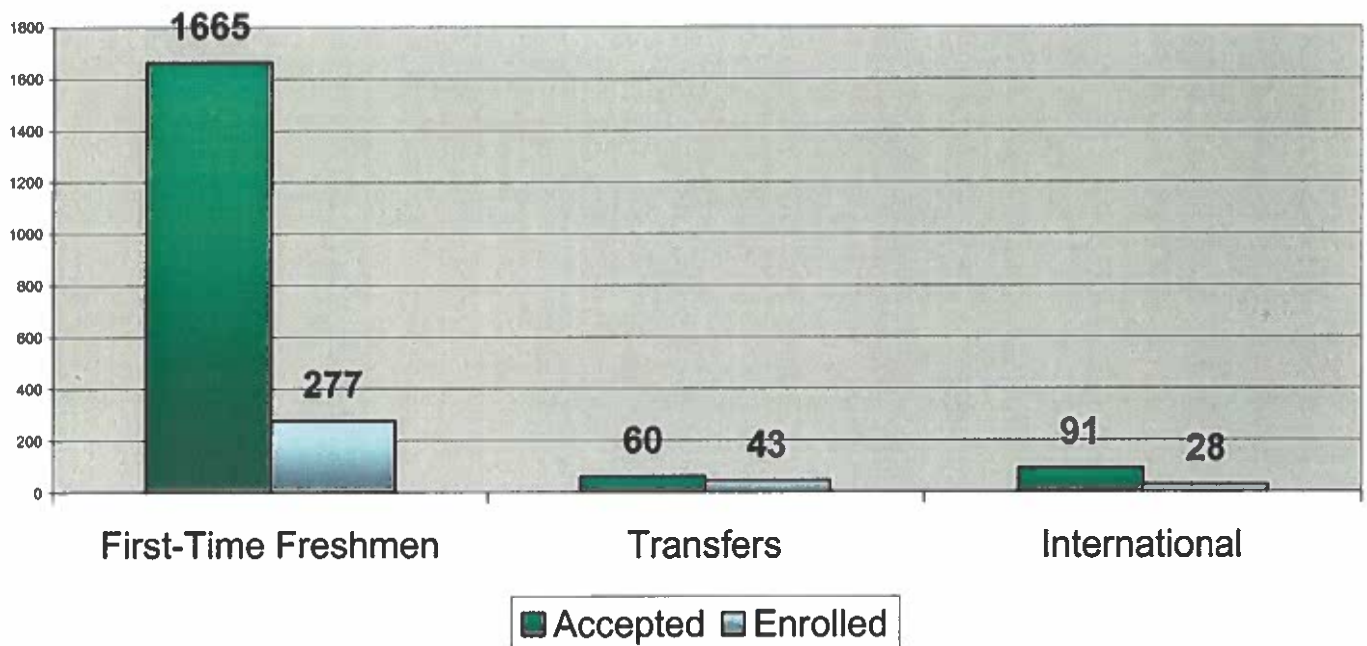

Fall 2002 New Student Data by Type



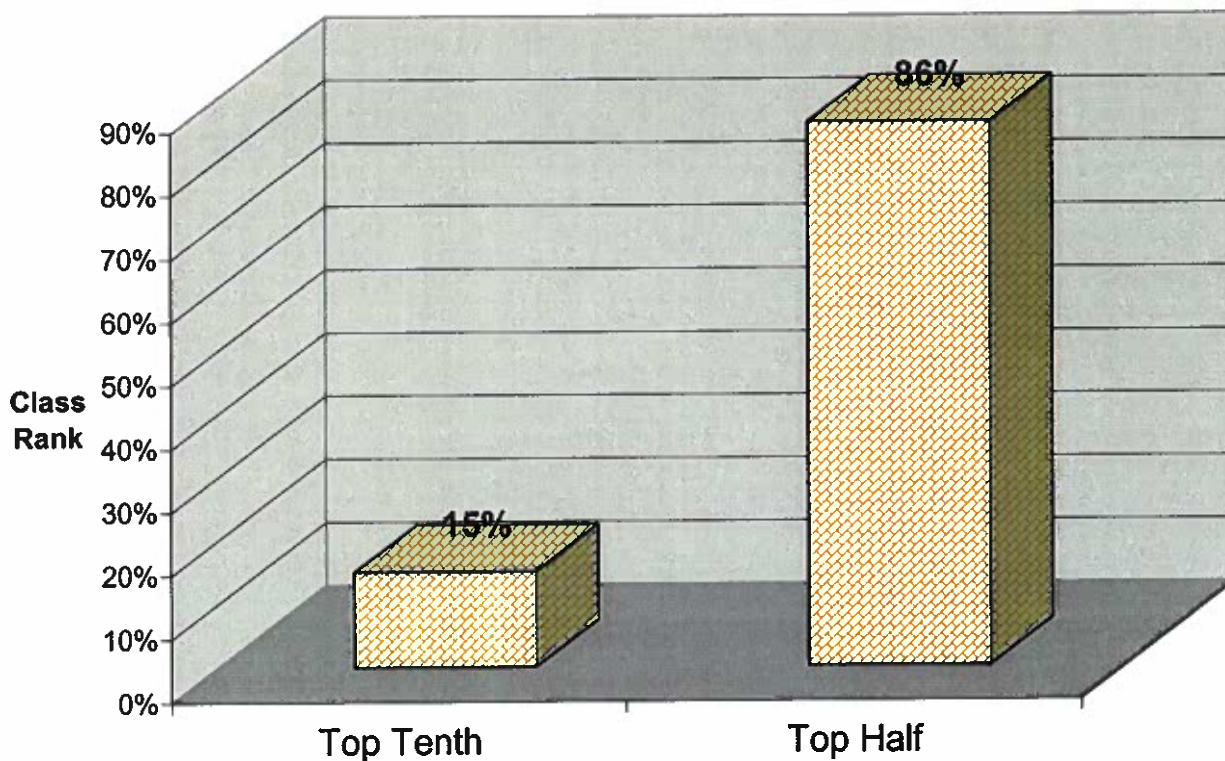

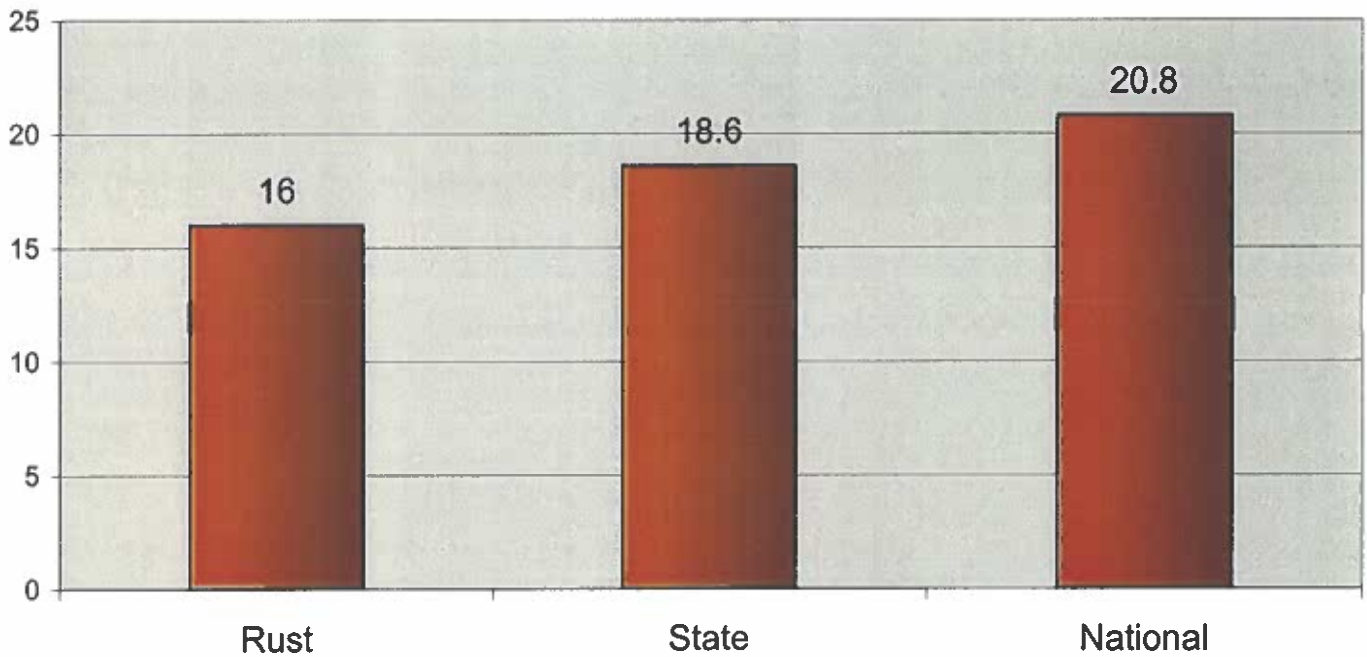

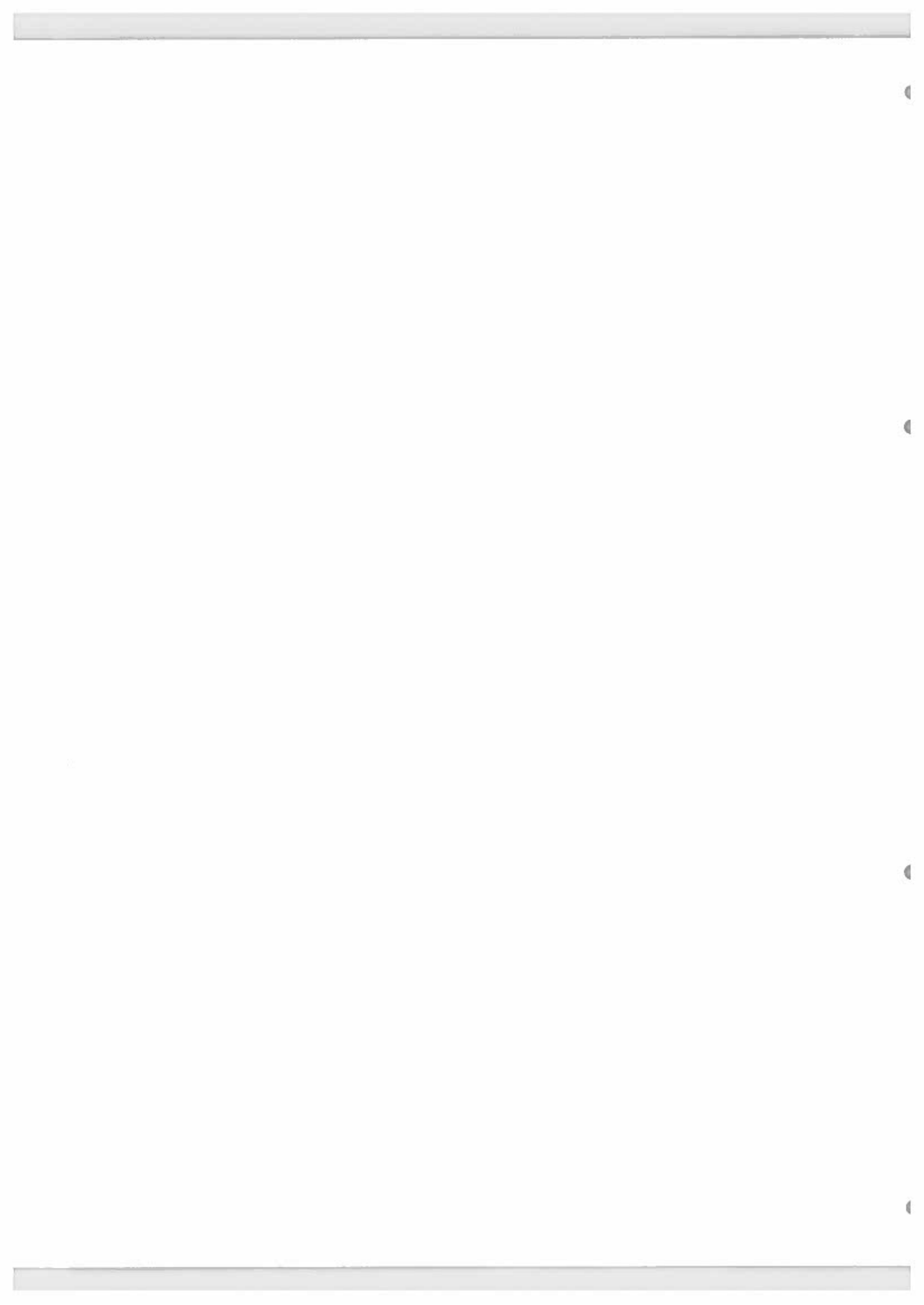

Fall 2002 ACT Composite Score Comparison

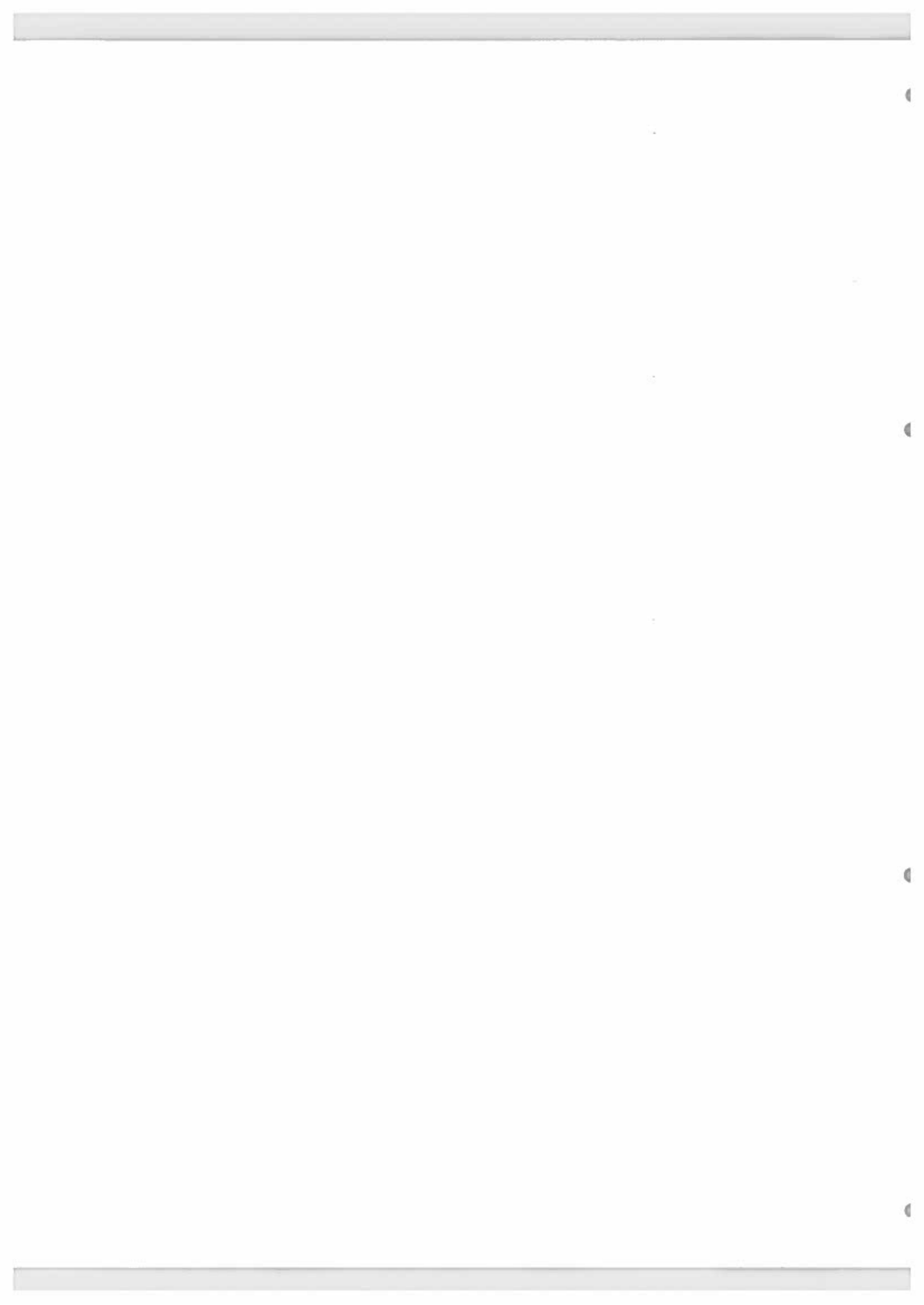




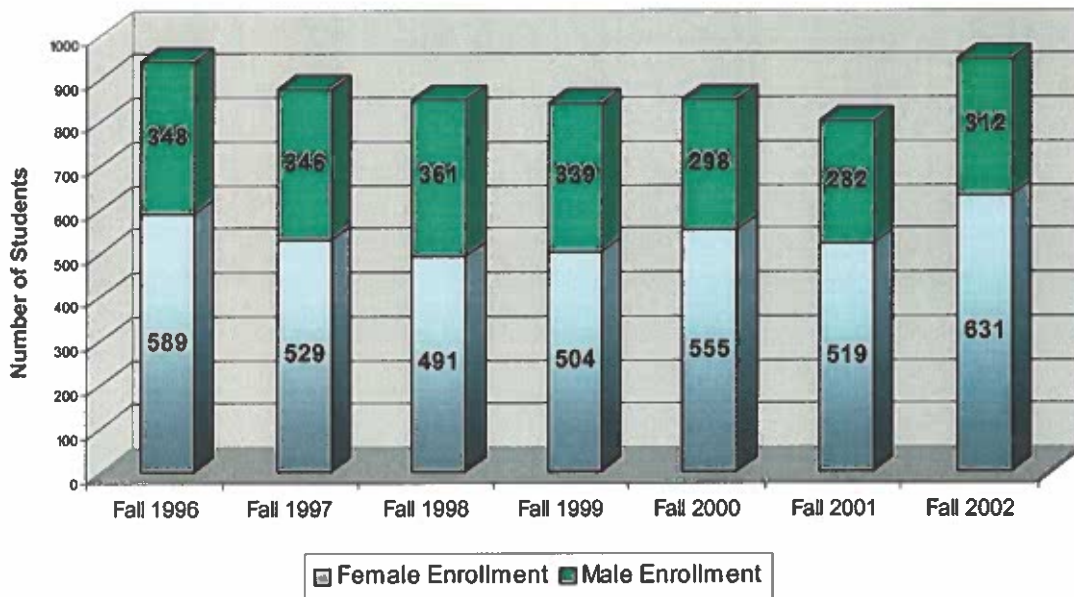

Opening Fall Enrollment by Gender

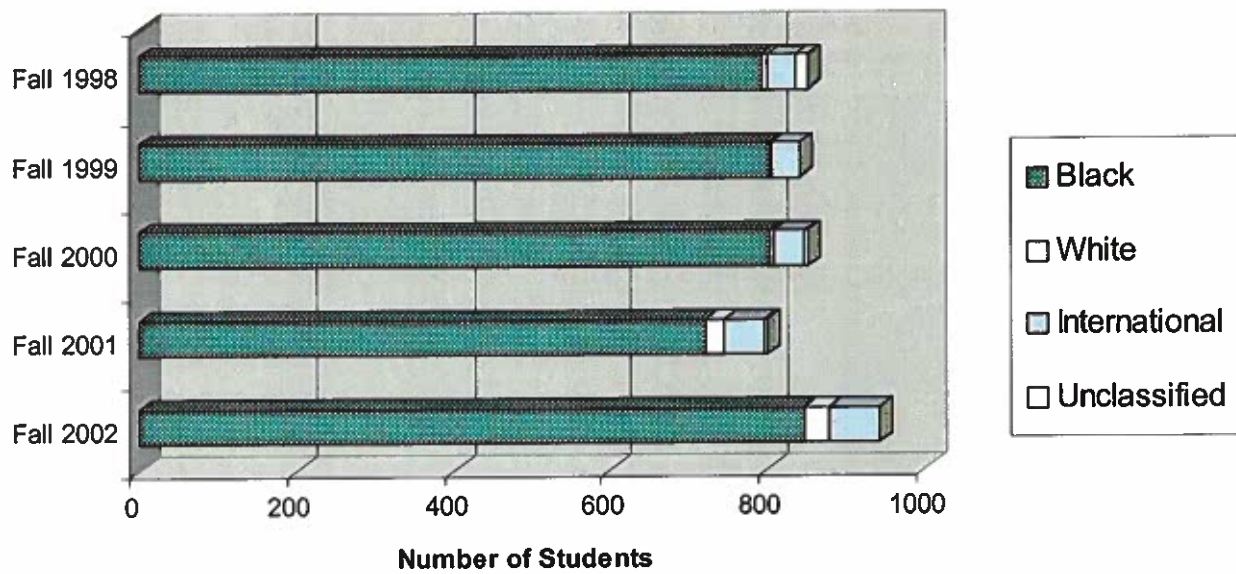

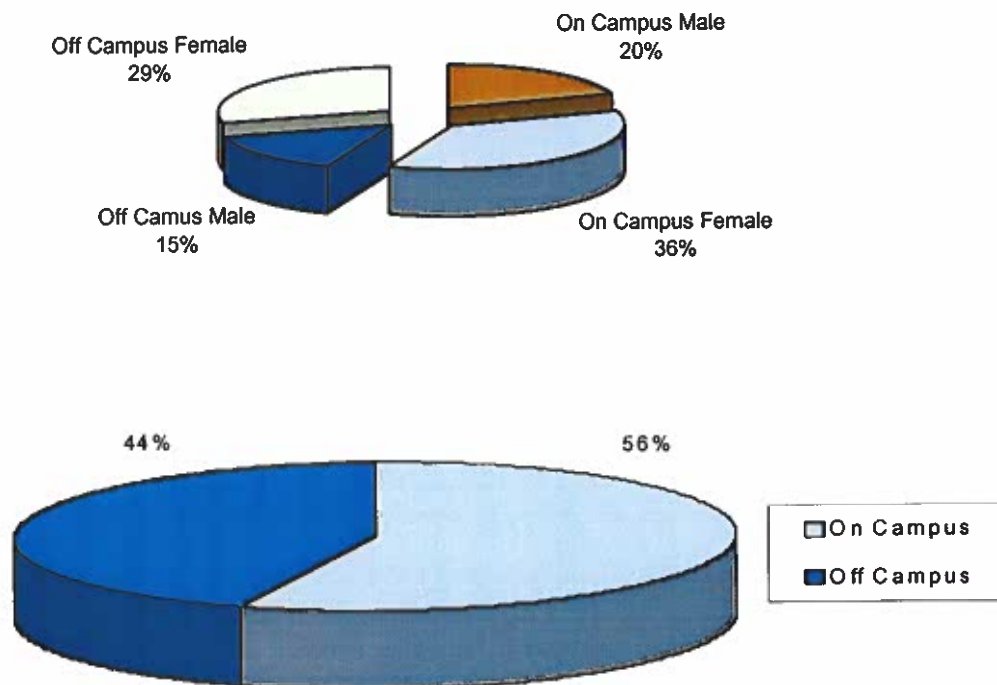
Full-Time Enrollment

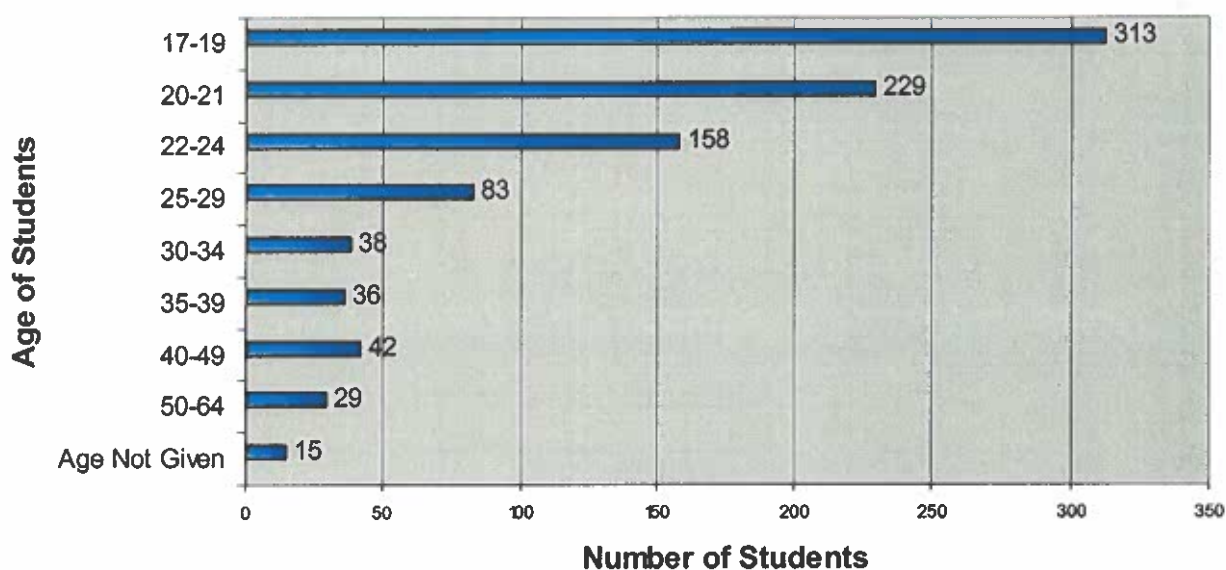
Student Enrollment by Race

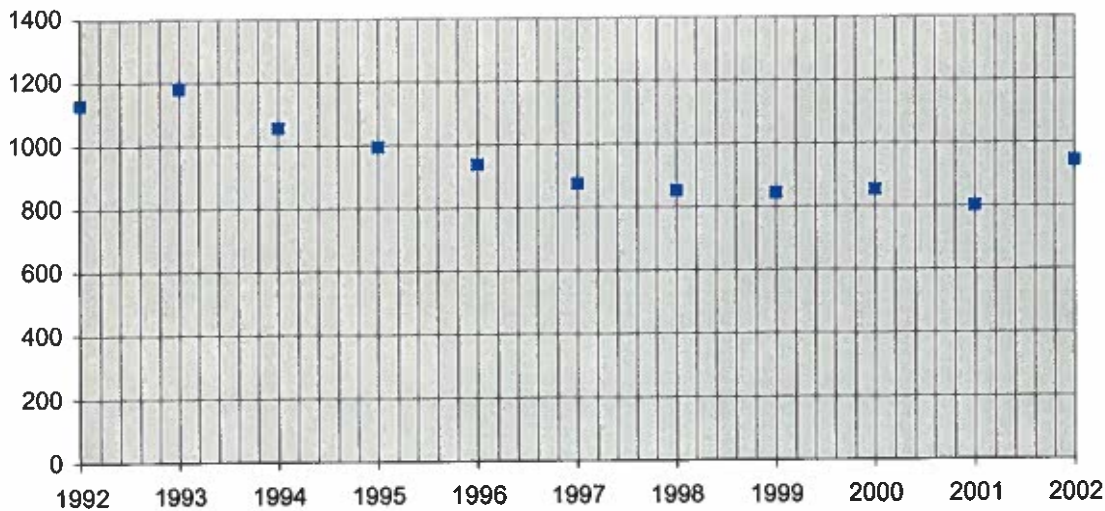

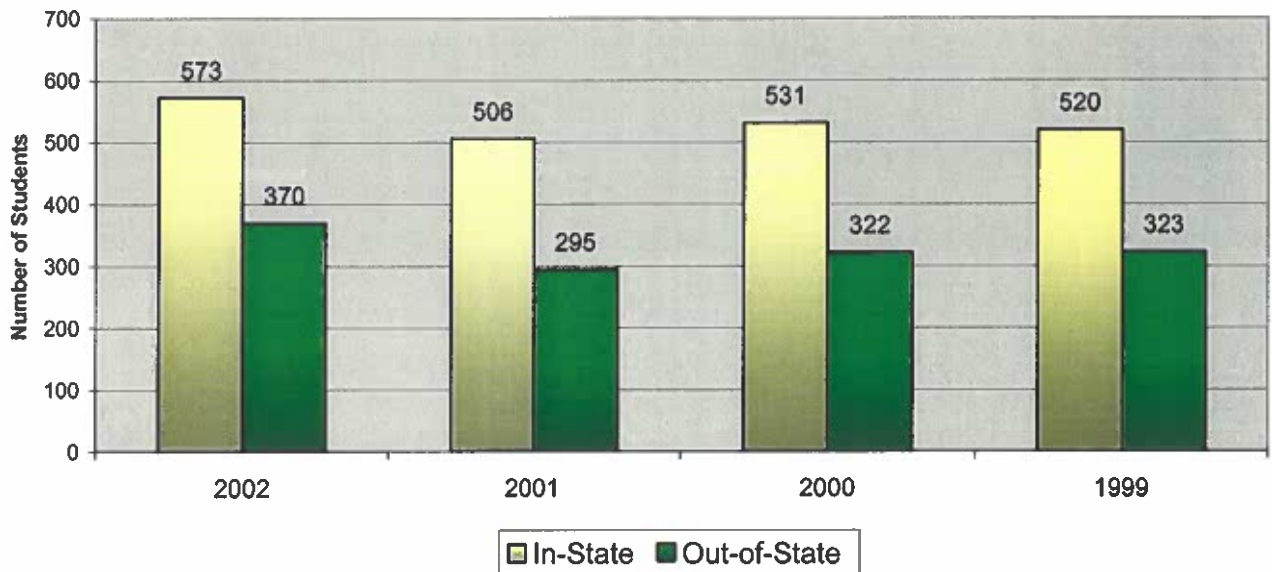

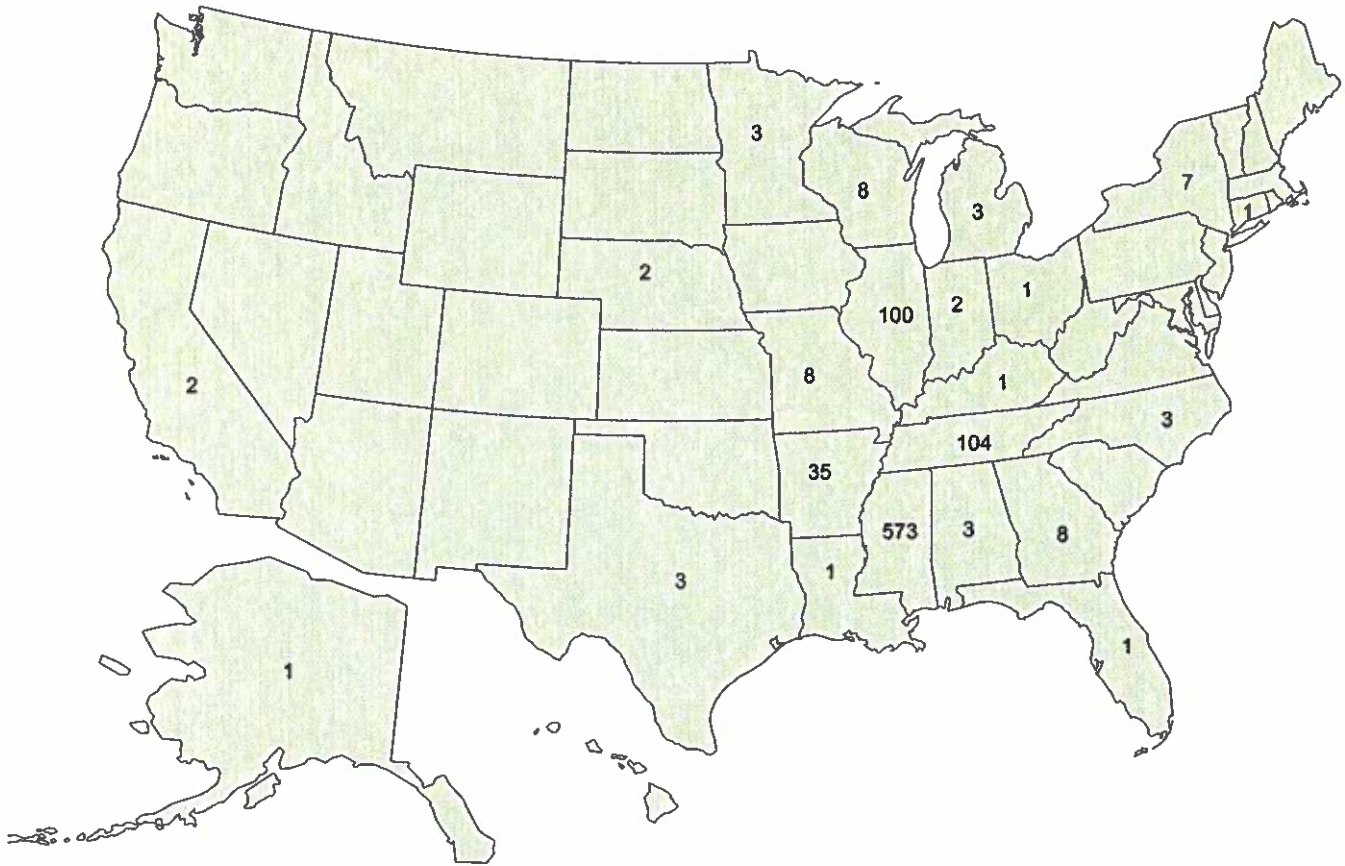

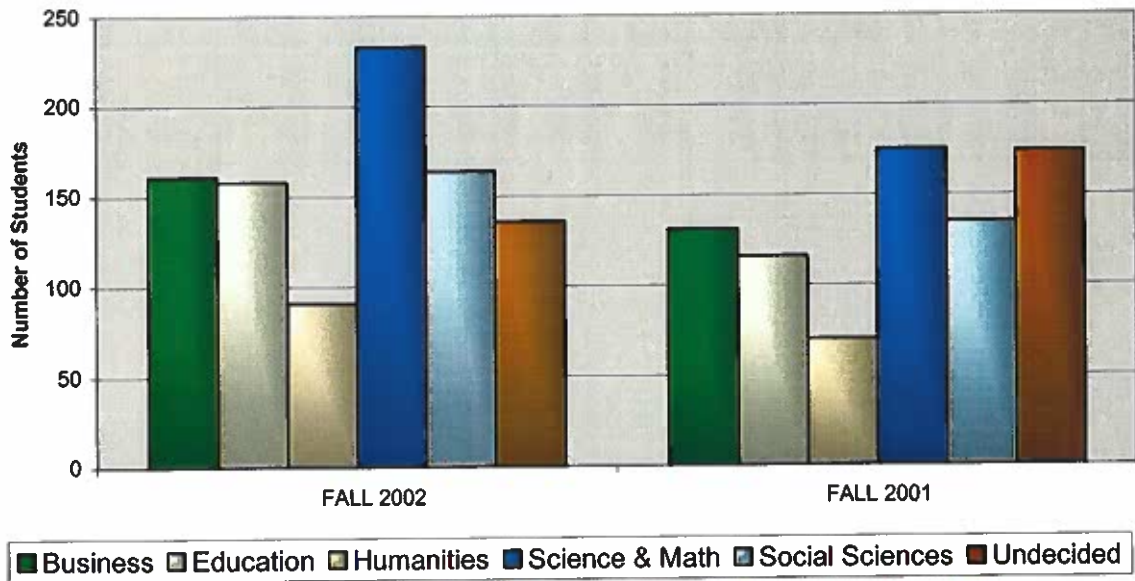

Number of Majors by Division



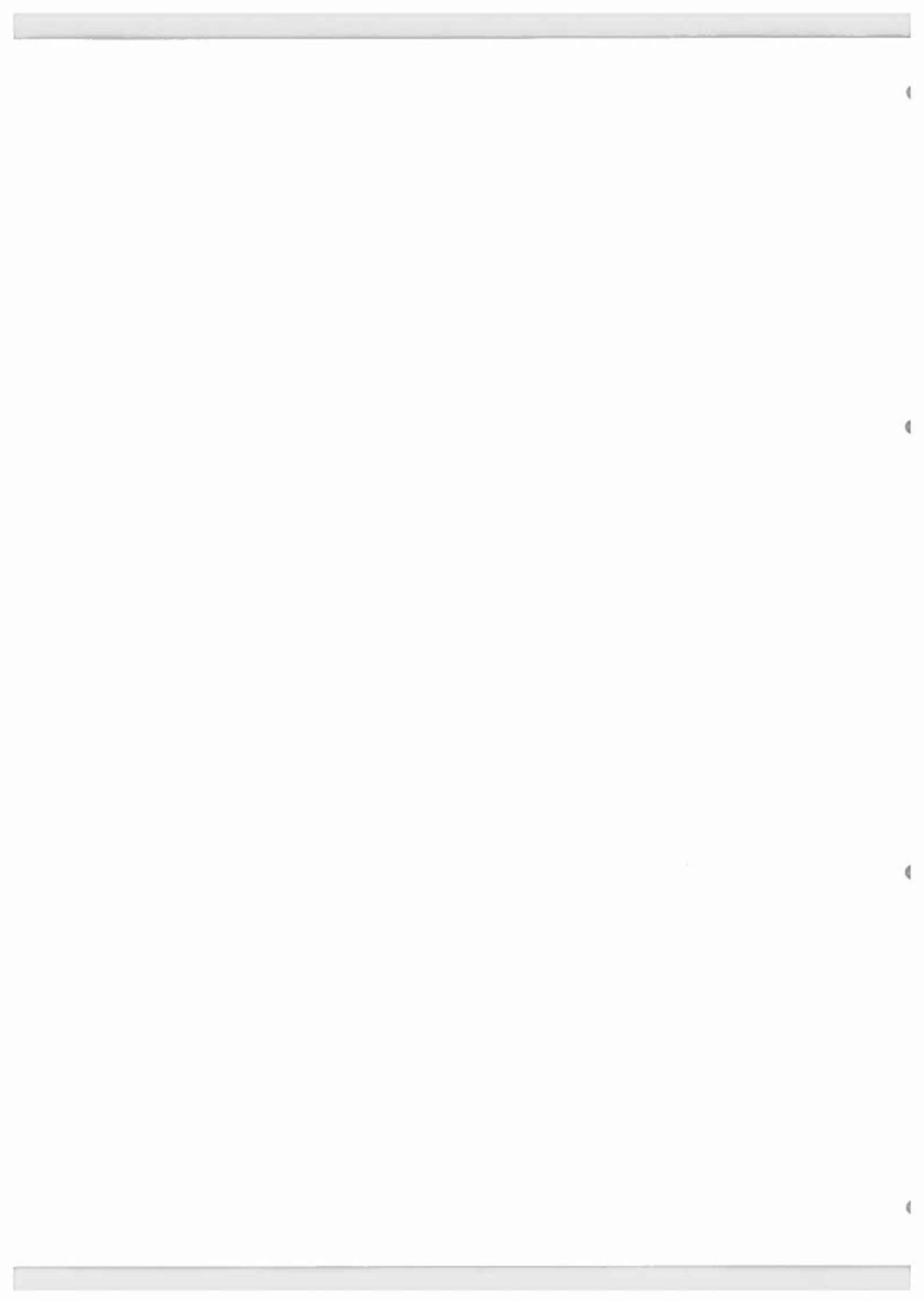

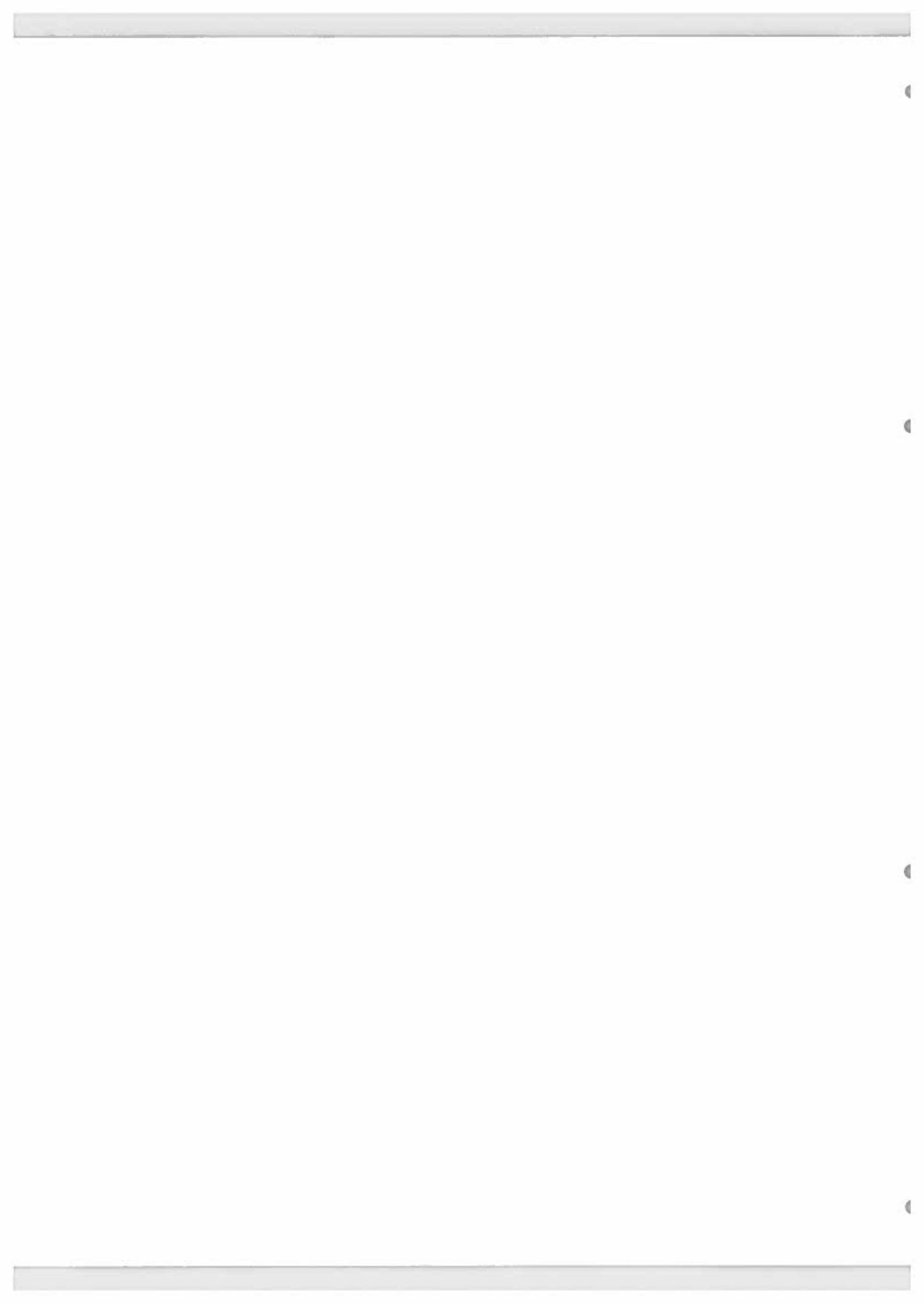

Nineteen Percent of Graduates Pursue Further Study Immediately After Graduation



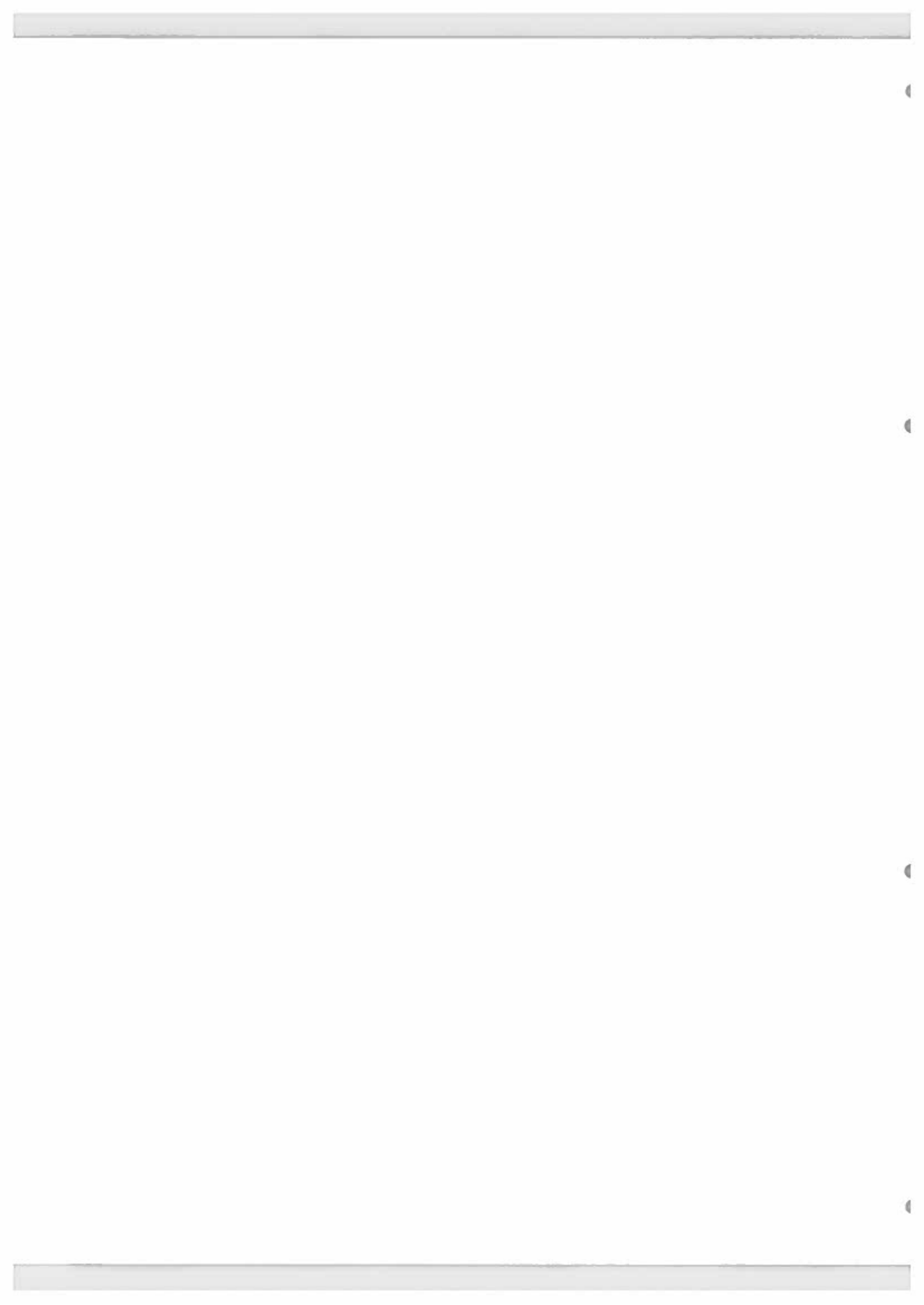

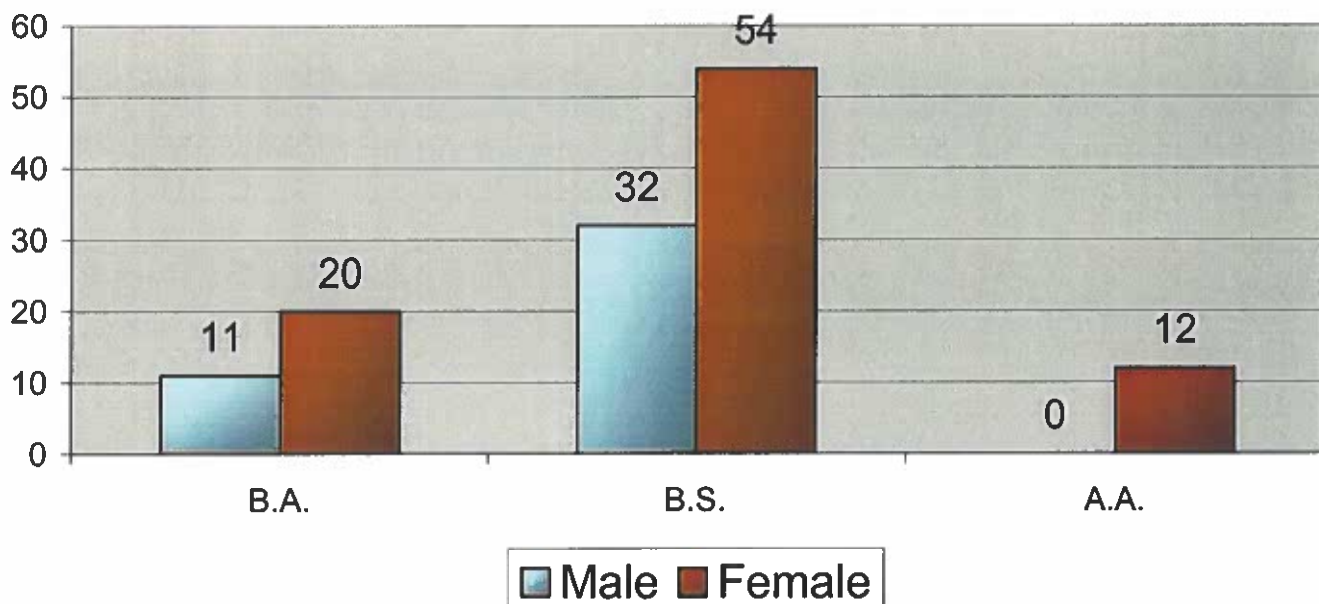

Degrees Awarded by Type and Gender Spring 2002

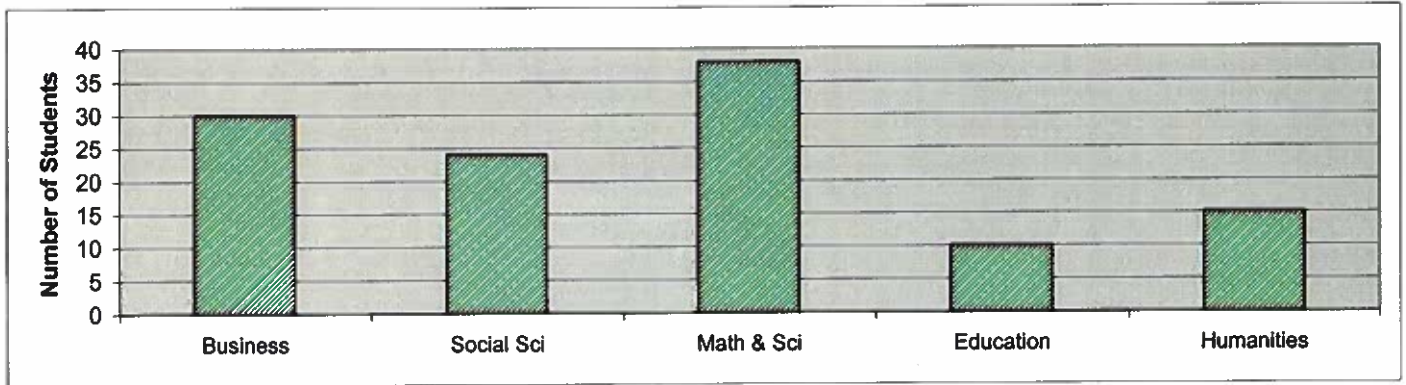

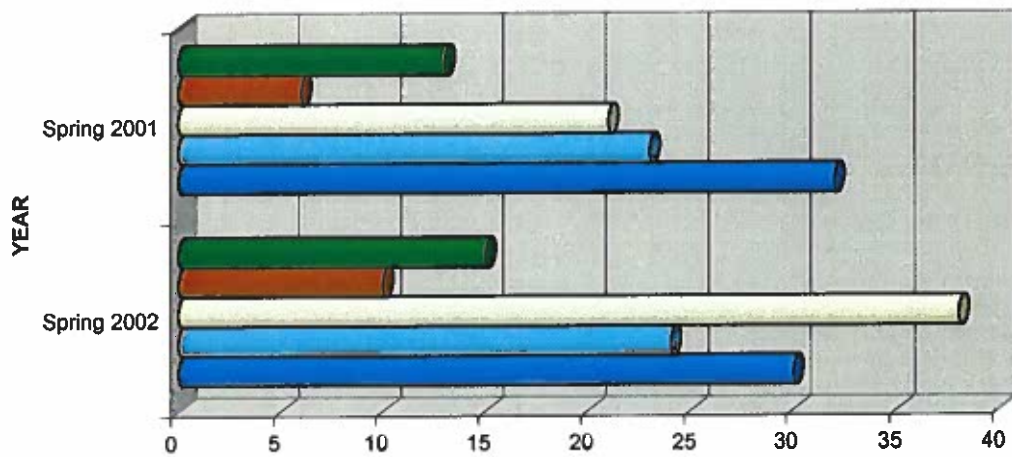

Number of Degrees Awarded by Division Spring 2001 and Spring 2002 Comparison

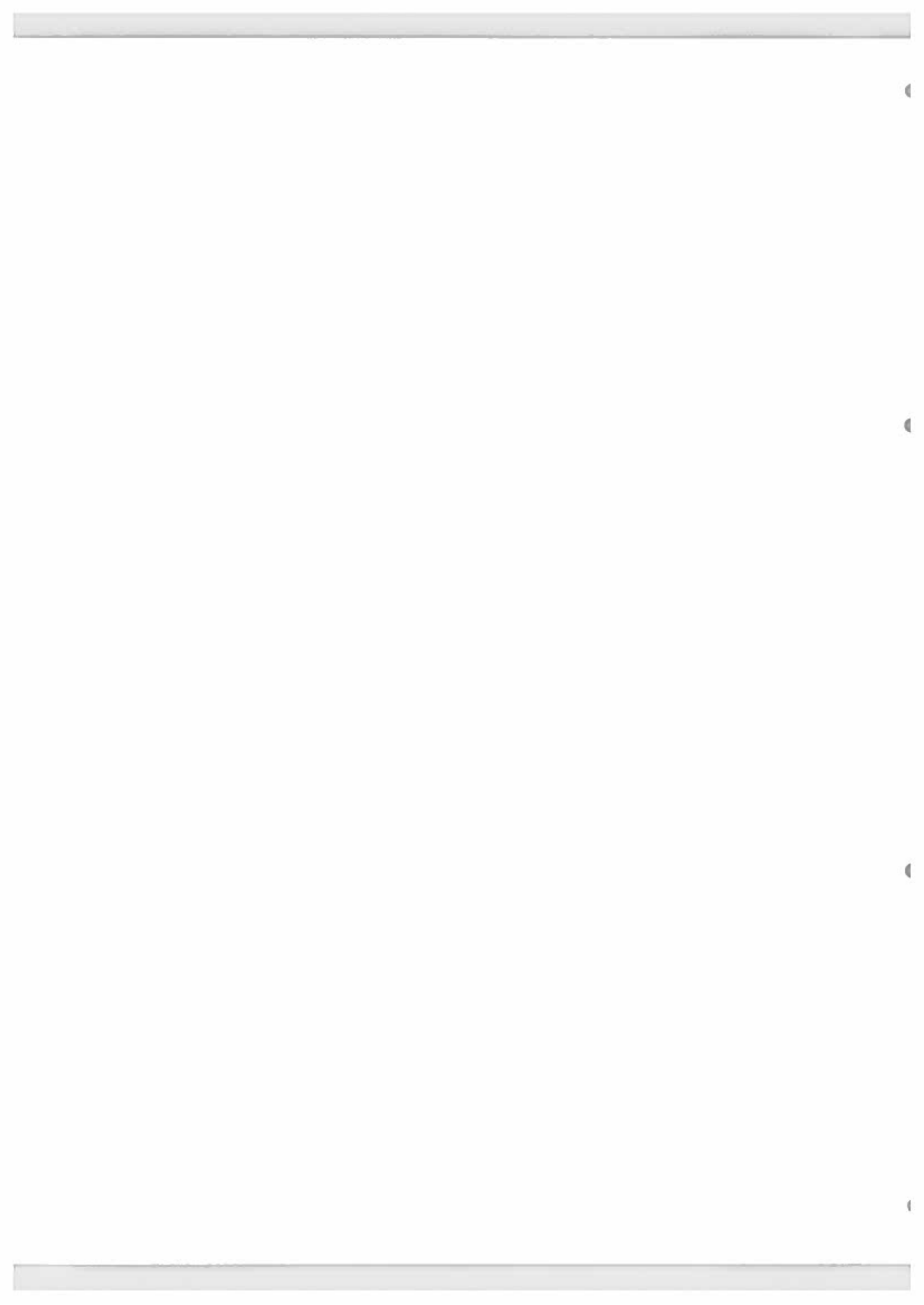

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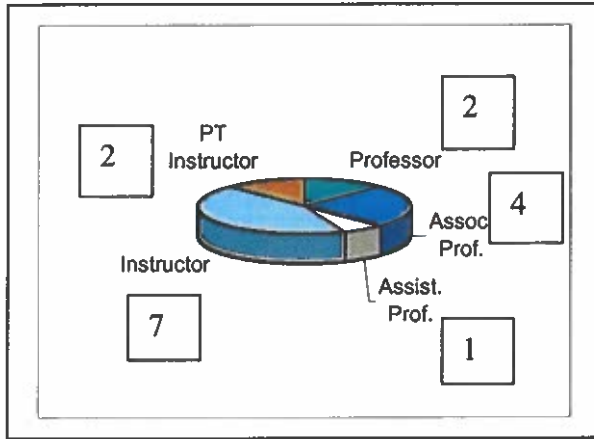

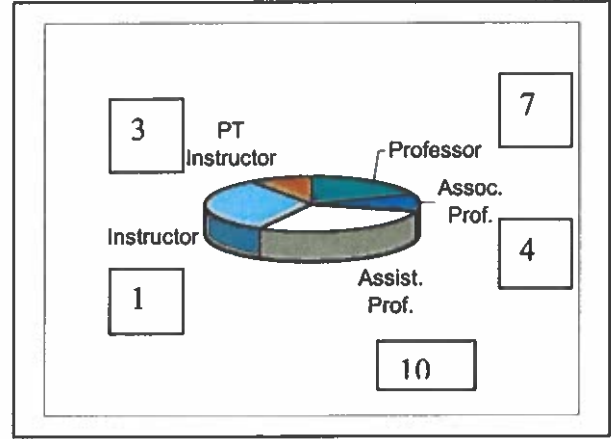


Fall 2002 Faculty Headcount by Rank and Gender

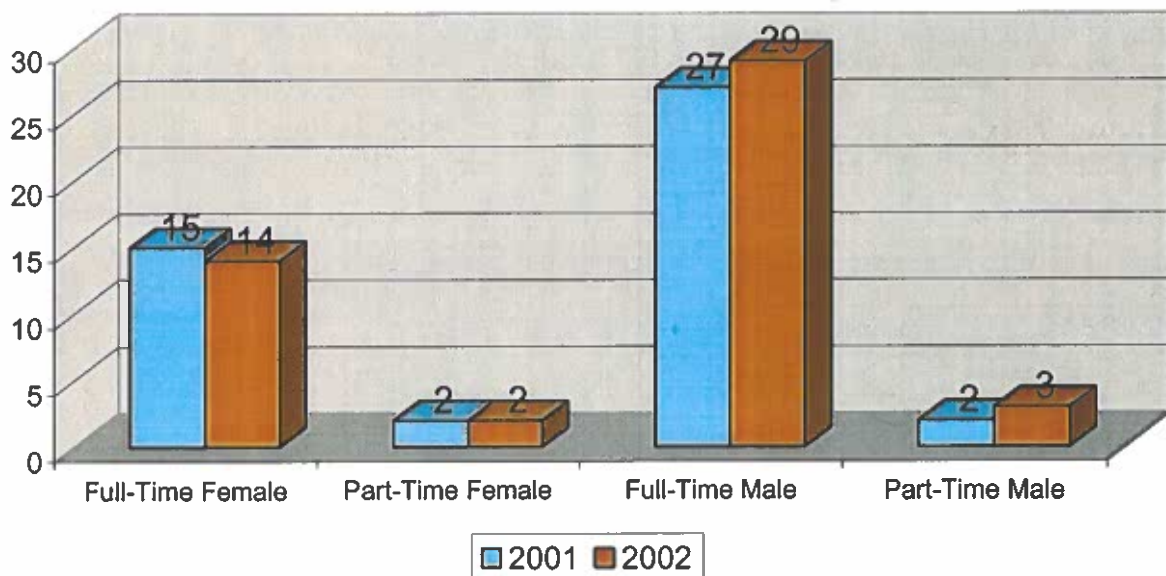

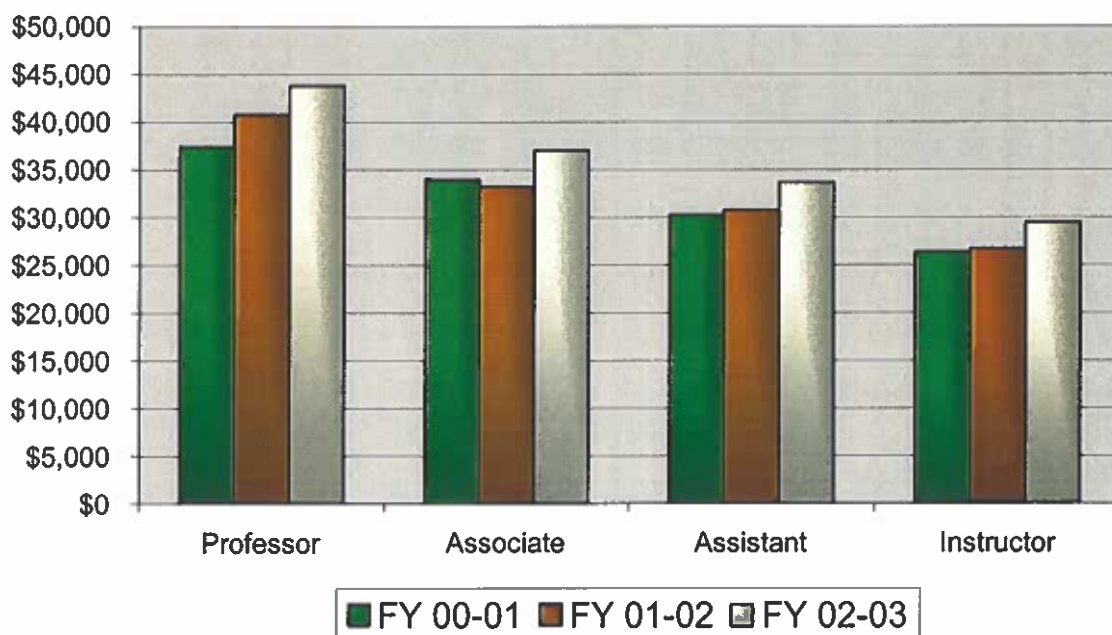

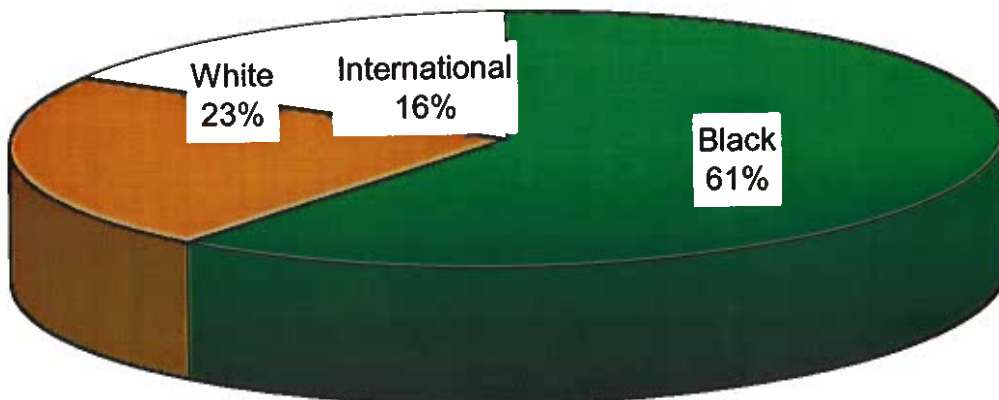

Fall 2002 Faculty by Race and Percent

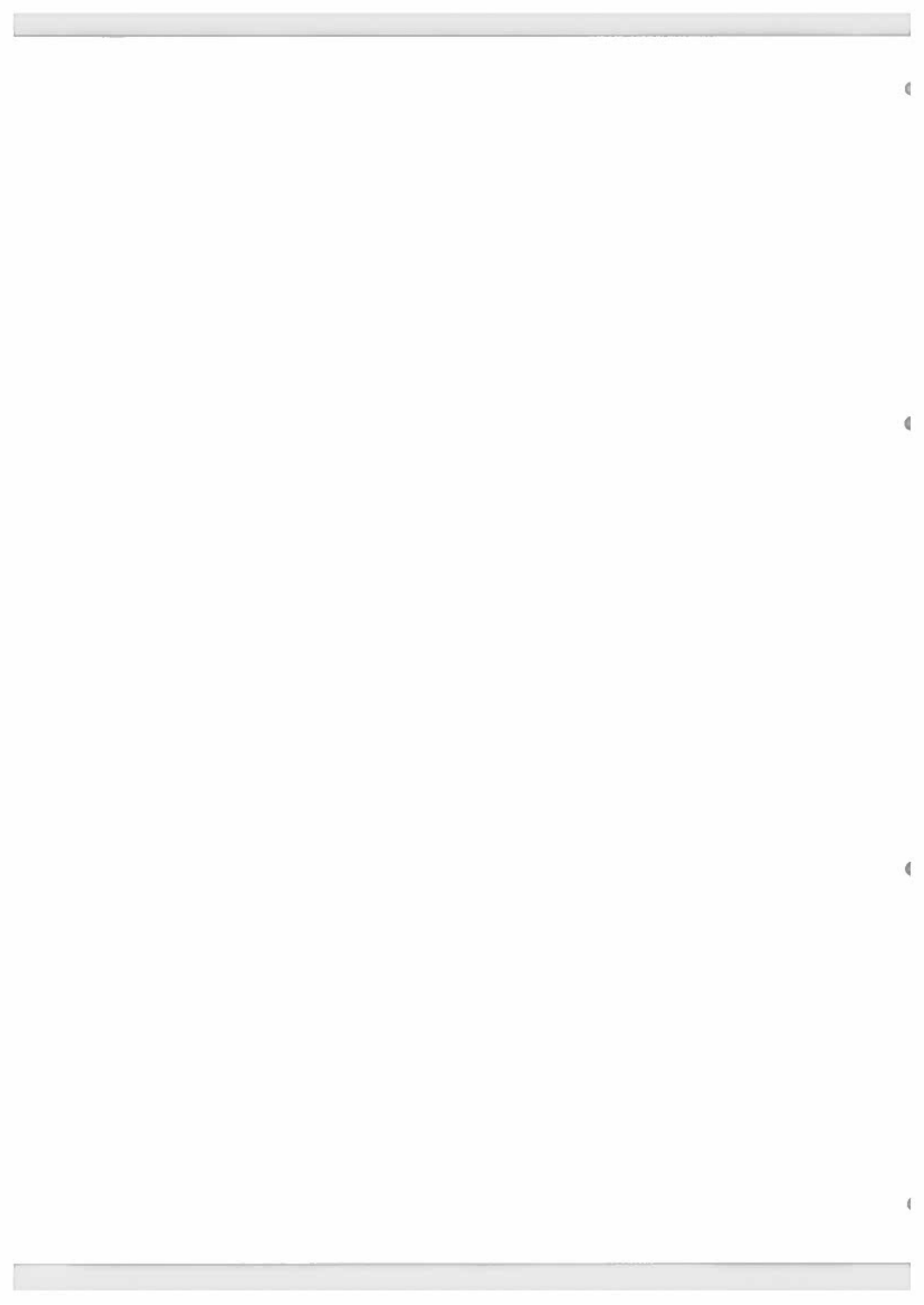

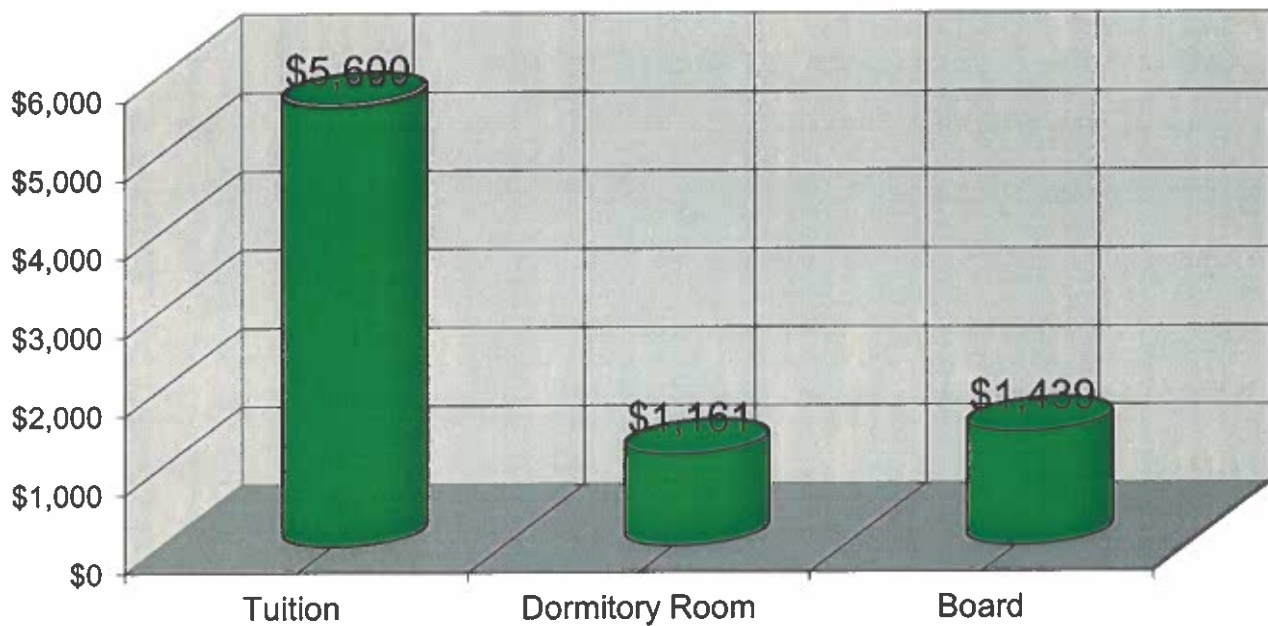

Total Tuition, Room and Board 2002-2003

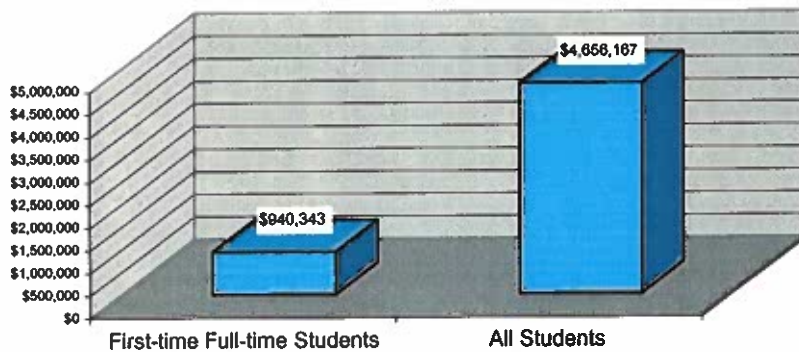

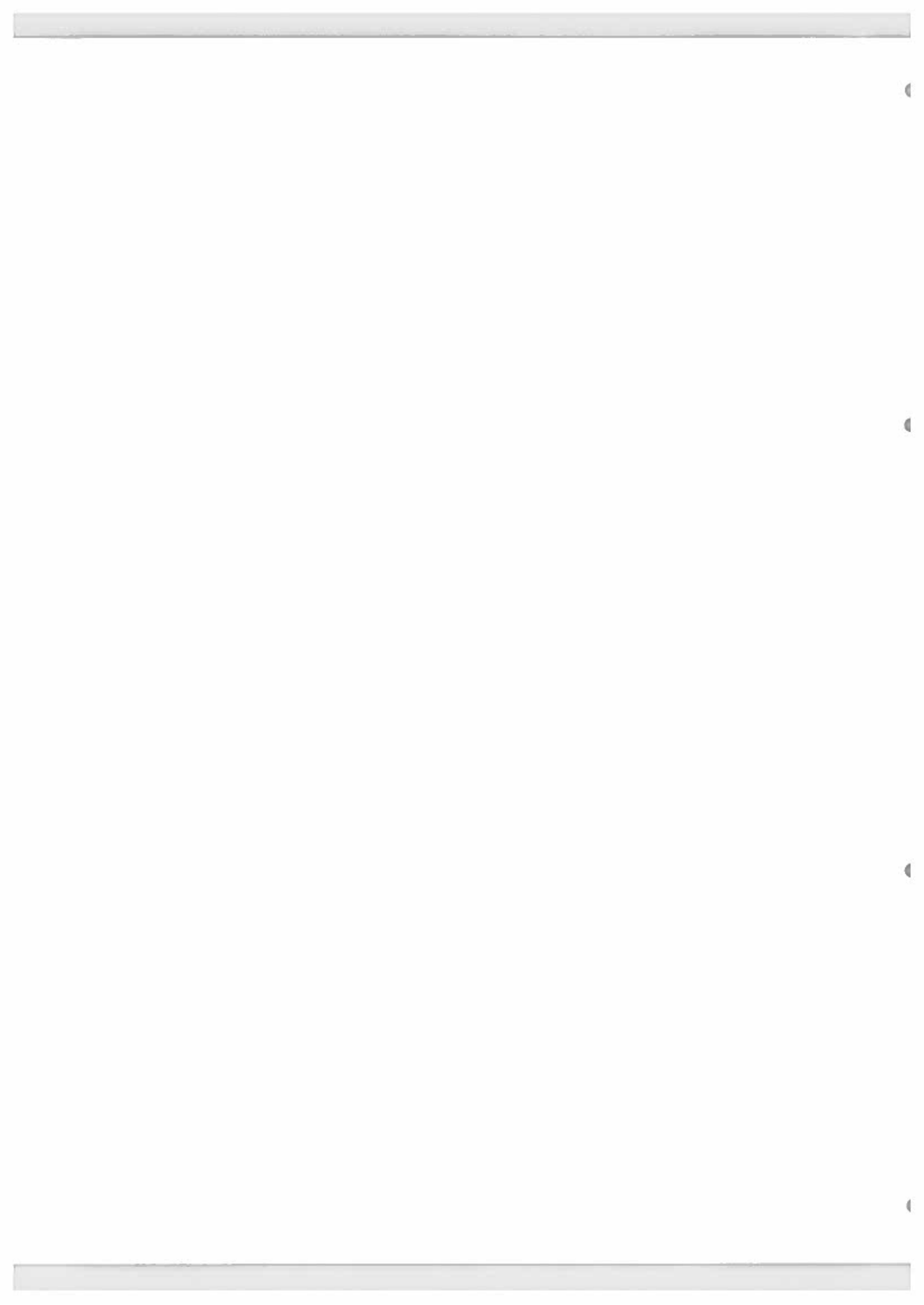

Revenues and Investment Return

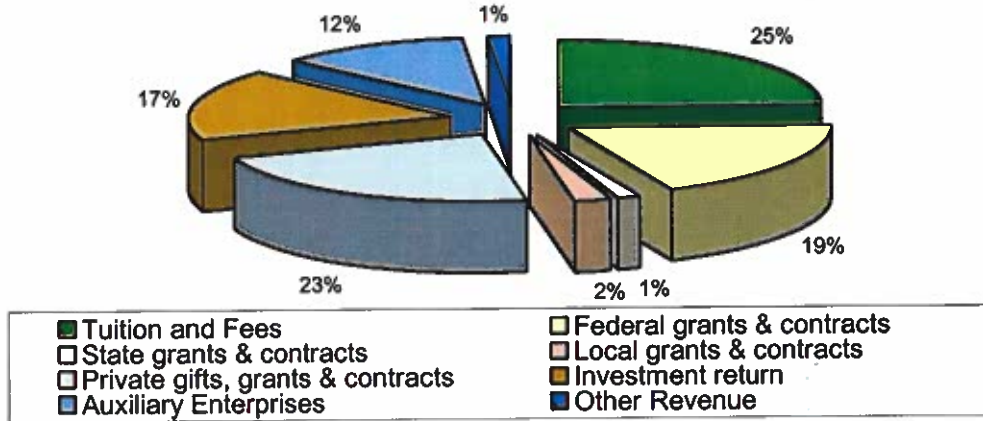

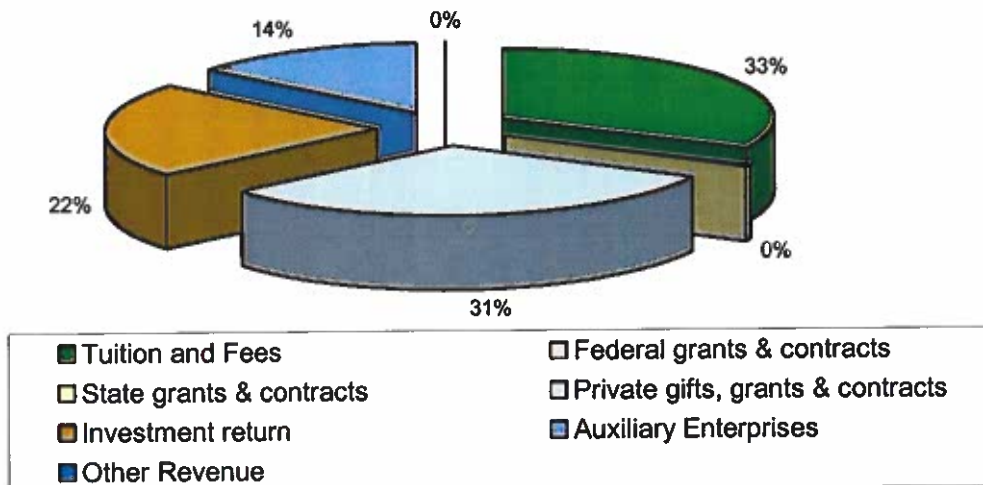

Expenses by Functional and Natural Classification

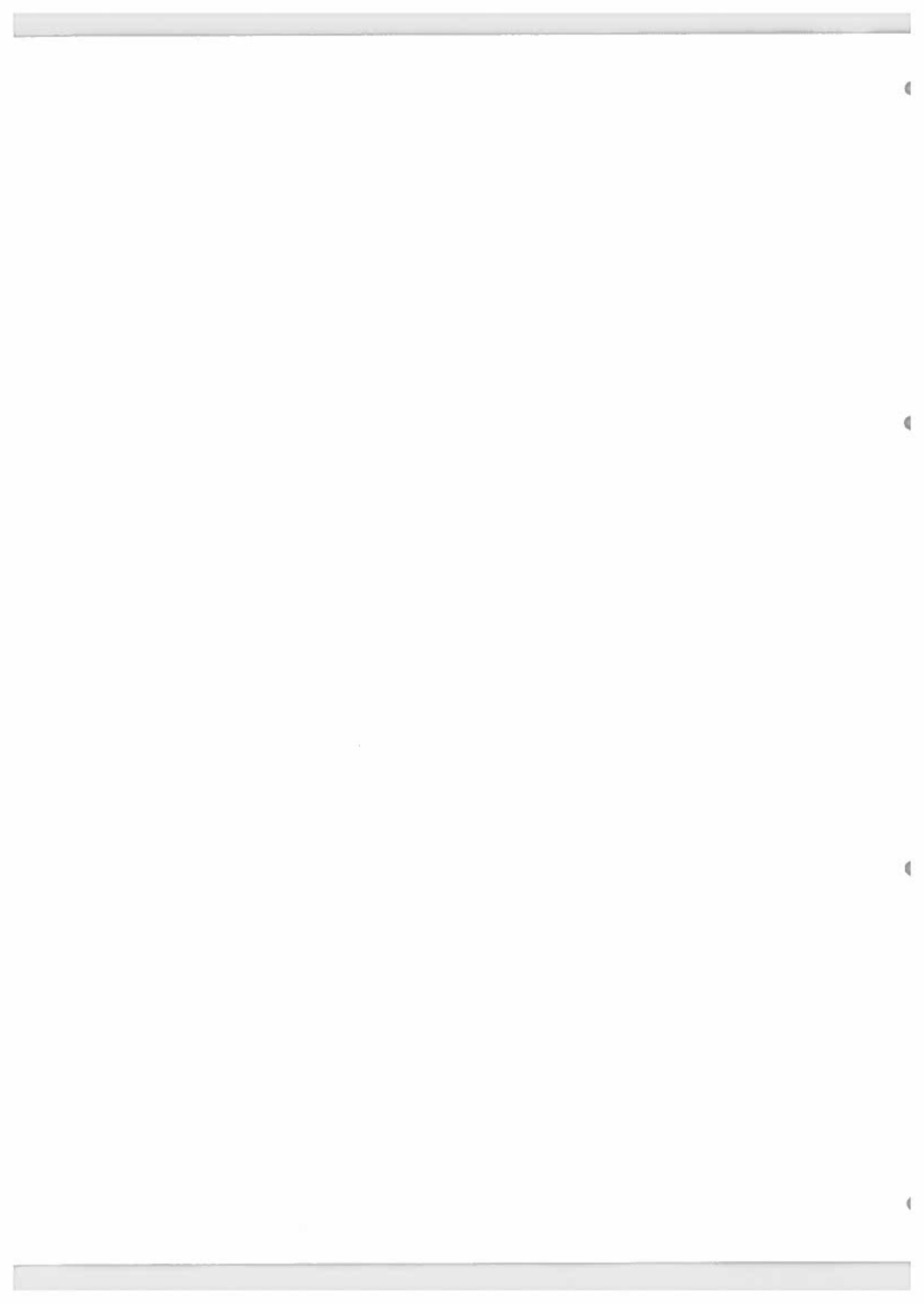

CAMPUS

Rust College is located thirty-five miles southeast of Memphis, Tennessee, in the city of Holly Springs, Mississippi. The campus consists of one hundred twenty-six acres on the north side of town. The entrance of the campus is located on Rust Avenue which connects North Randolph Street and State Highway 78 named Memphis Street. There are forty-seven building located on seventy-five acres of the campus. A twelve apartment complex behind the campus; five duplex apartments and four single dwellings located on Rust Avenue are for faculty and staff members.

OAKVIEW

According to oral history, Oakview Mansion was present when the church purchased the property in 1866 on a site reported to have been a slave auction market place prior to the Civil War. An Annex was added to the rear of the building in 1905 and again in 1918. Documents show that renovations took place in 1973, 1985 and 1994. Historic exterior preservation work was done in 2001 to duplicate the building's original detail. Special attention was given to the preservation of original brickwork. The request for Oakview to be placed on the National Register of Historical Places in the United States was done in 1976. Records reflect the addition of the building in 1982. Oakview currently houses the Public Relations and Alumni Affairs Office and includes two guest bedrooms, a storage area, a conference room and workstations.

THE McCARTY-VARNELL BUSINESS, COMPUTER AND SOCIAL SCIENCE BUILDING

The McCarty-Varnell Business, Computer and Social Science Building is a two-story brick structure which was constructed in 1989. It occupies 44,000 square feet, 80 percent classroom space, and 20 percent auditorium. The first floor contains The Heard Auditorium with a seating capacity of 383, a lecture classroom that will seat 75, a secretarial office pool, and classrooms. Computer Science, the Division of Social Science and the Division of Business are located in the complex.

THE McCOY ADMINISTRATION BUILDING

The McCoy Administration Building, named in honor of alumnus and eighth president Dr. Lee Marcus McCoy, is the landmark of Rust College. McCoy Hall, a two-story brick building with a tower approximately seven stories high, was completed in 1947. It is situated at an elevation of 590 feet. Its gross area is 23,000 square feet and the net assignable area is 20,464 square feet excluding the annex which was added in 1971 providing additional floor space of 1,826 square feet.

The first floor of the building houses the offices of the president, vice-president, institutional research, personnel, development, grants and contracts, fiscal affairs, and the computer center. The second floor houses the offices of the academic dean, the registrar, admissions and recruitment director, financial aid director and dean of students. Also, located on the second floor is the president's conference room. McCoy is listed in the National Register of Historical Places in the United States.

Something very unique to Rust Campus and Holly Springs is this building had installed in 1948 (gifted by an alumnus) the clock with chimes placed in the tower. For 45 years the chimes rang out over the town. In 1993 the chimes were replaced and they now ring a hymn every hour on the hour from 6:00 am to 11:00 pm. They continue to be heard across the town and into the countryside.

THE PRESIDENT'S HOME

The president's Home, an attractive brick bungalow located on the east side entrance of the campus, was constructed in 1958. Since that time, renovations included the addition of three bedrooms, a meeting room and a den of 3,500 square feet.

THE McDONALD SCIENCE BUILDING

The McDonald Science Hall, a two-story reinforced concrete structure with brick veneer exterior, was constructed in 1966. It occupies a net assignable area of 17,616 square feet consisting of classrooms, a lecture room, science laboratories, and faculty offices for the Division of Science and Mathematics. A two-story annex was completed in January 1994. The Emma B. Miller Science Annex has been designed to accommodate additional classrooms, laboratory space, and faculty offices. The assignable area of the annex is 5,100 square feet.

THE W.A. McMILLAN MULTI-PURPOSE CENTER

The W.A. McMillan Multi-Purpose Center was completed in 1972. It occupies 52,000 square feet, which has undergone extensive repairs. The building consists of classrooms, faculty and staff offices, a conference room, a gymnasium, an Olympic size swimming pool, weight room, and mechanical room. The gymnasium accommodates 1,600 spectators during basketball games and 2,200 persons during special programs, convocations, or other public occasions.

The annex, which was added in 1972 houses the Student Center. There is adequate space for a snack bar, billiards, ping-pong games, and a novelty shop.

THE RAINSFORD A. and RUTH M. BROWN MASS COMMUNICATION CENTER

The Rainsford A. and Ruth M. Brown Mass Communications center is one of the outstanding highlights of the campus because of its unique modern structural design. This building accommodates a multiplicity of educational programs, which consist of 30,284 square feet. The following areas are in the building: television and radio studios, two production rooms, five offices, three classrooms, a laboratory and dark room, and the Shaw Cafeteria. Constructed in 1981, it features all necessary equipment that provides accessibility to the disabled. The Humanities Department has office space in this building.

THE DOXEY/ALUMNI FINE ARTS CENTER

The Doxey/Alumni Fine Arts Center was constructed in 1974. The building occupies 36,160 square feet. This two-story brick building houses the 595 seat Albert Morehouse Auditorium with a balcony (seating for 155) and a modern stage for dramatic and musical presentations. This building has two modern theater-style dressing rooms with bathroom facilities. In addition, it houses both faculty and staff offices for the areas of music, speech and drama, art, and English and modern foreign languages.

THE POST OFFICE/LAUNDRY BUILDING

The Post Office/Laundry Multi-Purpose Building is an attractive one-story structure completed in 1992. The post office receives all incoming mail. The mail is placed in combination boxes which serve students, faculty and staff. It occupies 3648 square feet. The laundry is equipped with eighteen washers and dryers. The laundry area is open twelve hours daily.

GROSS HALL

Gross Hall is an attractive three-story building dedicated in 1966 for the purpose of housing male students. It occupies a net assignable area of 19,048 square feet and provides housing for ninety-two male students. A spacious lounge and living quarter for the counselor and adequate bathrooms on all floors are included.

WIFF HALL

Wiff hall, a three-story building, was dedicated in 1966 as a residence hall for women students. It occupies a total assignable space of 21,657 square feet, housing ninety-two students. In addition to rooms for students, the first floor includes a spacious recreation room, kitchen, and two guest rooms in the basement. It also contains a spacious lounge, living quarters for the counselor with two bathrooms and a receptionist area. The second and third floors consist of rooms for students with two bathrooms on each floor.

E. L. RUST HALL

E. L. Rust Hall, a two-story brick structure completely renovated in 1990, replaced the old E. L. Rust Hall which was built in 1884. It occupies 28,585 square feet. The building is equipped with individual heating and air-conditioning units, houses 192 women students, and includes a lounge and living quarters for the counselor on the first floor with adequate bathrooms on both floors.

DAVAGE-SMITH HALL

Davage-Smith Hall, a two-story brick building, was renovated in 1990 to house 152 male students. It occupies 31,032 square feet. The building contains a television room, a study room and private living quarters for the counselor.

THE EMMA ELZY WOMEN'S LIVING/LEARNING CENTER

The Emma Elzy Women's Living/Learning Center is a uniquely attractive, brick two-story dormitory which was constructed in 1991 to house 200 women. This building consists of 26,000 square feet. The Learning Center has a library and computers available to students for their studies.

CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER

The Child Development Center was constructed in 1989. It consists of 1,100 square feet with office space, reception area, three classrooms, and two restrooms.

THE LEONTYNE PRICE LIBRARY

The Leontyne Price Library received a "Citation for Excellence in Architecture" in 1972 by College and University Magazine, an honor which helps to reiterate the fact that college libraries are planned to meet the informational, cultural, and requirements for their clientele. The building, named to honor the famous Metropolitan Opera star, is located in the hub of the academic area. It is located directly in the center of the campus, and serves as a focal point of all educational and cultural needs of the entire campus. The library occupies 40,950 square feet.

JOHN DAVIS PHYSICAL PLANT BUILDING

The Davis Physical Plant Building built in 1999 provides offices, storage, a garage area and workshop. It occupies 3,200 square feet of space.

J.L. GRIFFIN WAREHOUSE/BOOKSTORE

The Griffin Warehouse was constructed in 1980 and occupies 6,000 square feet which adequately stores supplies and equipment. Books for the academic programs are also issued from the Warehouse. All college inventory records are maintained in this building. All supplies and equipment are received at the Warehouse.

SHAW HALL

Shaw Hall was built in 1952 and consists of 9,000 square feet of useable space. It was remodeled in 1991. It evolved from a dormitory for women, a cafeteria, to an office building, which now houses the Office for Student Support Services, Retention/Student Counseling, and Educational Talent Search.

MAGIC JOHNSON SPORTS COMPLEX

The Magic Johnson Sports Complex was constructed and completed during the 1992-93 school year. It occupies approximately five acres on the northeast section of the campus.

The complex consists of a six-lane NCAA regulation track, a basketball court and six tennis courts. There are seating areas and bleachers near the track, basketball and tennis areas.

THE DAVID L. BECKLEY CONFERENCE CENTER

The David L. Beckley Conference Center was completed in 2000. It is designed for inter-relationships with the local community such as continuing education, entrepreneurial development, work readiness programs and meetings. The building is located directly across Rust Avenue from the campus. It houses the permanent Ronald Trojcek collection of African Tribal Art.

THE JAMES A. ELAM CHAPEL

The James Elam Chapel is a one-story brick structure that occupies 4,560 square feet and was completed in 2001. It has a seating capacity of 250. It is named in honor of donor James Andrew Elam of Dayton, Ohio.
